WILLIAM PETERSON PC '88

s alumni, we all have our individual reasons to look back fondly on our time at Gamma Iota. For most of us, these were critical, formative years that served as a launch ramp for the men we would become.

As we first walked up the steps of 503 University, some of us were primed to succeed, pre-loaded with personal discipline, solid goals and the academic chops to pursue them.

Others (myselfincluded) pledged mostly for the social aspects of Greek life.

In fact, for all the academic, philanthropic and intramural success that our castle on the corner enjoyed in the mid to late '80s, the free spirits in the house still outnumbered the grade-chasers by a hefty margin. Among our ranks in the pledge class of 1988, I had the honor of befriending one the rarest of all creatures on the Vandal campus at that time: a dedicated social animal who could also excel in the classroom and beyond.

He was my roommate-a fellow by the name of William Peterson. To me he was just Billy-one of many northern Idaho students who populated the house at the time. From the moment I met him, however, I knew he was going to soar to great heights beyond our time at Gamma Iota.

Along with a record class of 22 new recruits, Peterson pledged Delta Sig in the fall of 1988. He joined the chapter for its extremely close-knit atmosphere, and the fact that many of the members were originally from his hometown of Sandpoint. He says that to him, Gamma Iota felt like a family, unlike the other fraternities at U of I.


Like with so many of us from that era, his greatest memories being a member of the Gamma Iota chapter were the Sailor's Ball, and the numerous comedians in the house like Mike "Bean" Anderson and Andrew Murphy, a.k.a. "the Fridge."

Despite (or perhaps inspired roommates (looking at you, Ron Clarke), Peterson went on to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice in 1992. Upon graduation, he was commissioned as a U.S. Navy Surface Warfare Officer. He served in this capacity for 7 years. To say the least, it was an impressive start to a promising career, but it was only a preamble to the successes he would rack up in the following decades.

In 1999, Peterson went to work as a Special Agent (SA) of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Through 2007, he was assigned to the San Diego Division, where he worked violent-crime and terrorism investigations. His work also took him overseas in 2005-2006, where he conducted international terrorism investigations in Iraq. While there, he was embedded with DOD Task Force 88 and participated in Operation Steel Curtain. The efforts were focused on Al Qaeda in Iraq (predecessor to ISIS) and its leader, Abu Musab Zarqawi, who was ultimately killed in a U.S. airstrike.

In 2007, Peterson was promoted and transferred to the FBI's Counterterrorism Division, where he specialized in international terrorism and threats emanating from Europe. Through April 2009, he oversaw counterterrorism operations in Afghanistan as the FBI's Deputy on-Scene Commander and liaison officer to Task Force 373.

Then for the next 4 years, he served as the FBI's Chief of Operations in Athens, Greece, where he worked with the Greek police to solve the 2007 rocket attack against the U.S. Embassy. During this time, Peterson also helped secure the conviction of a Hezbollah operative captured in Cyprus. (This work helped to form U.S. policy to influence the EU to designate the military wing of Hezbollah as a terrorist organization.)

From 2013 to early 2018, he was by) the lackadaisical antics of his a Supervisory Special Agent over the San Diego Division's Homegrown Violent Extremist squad, followed by a stint as the FBI's Chief of Operations in Switzerland. In this capacity, thwarted 17 terrorist attacks worldwide against Western interests. Most notably, he was responsible for

the capture of the most significant elite cybercriminal in FBI history, Vladislav Kliushin, after he landed his private jet in the Swiss alps.

Following his tour in Switzerland, he was assigned as the FBI's Chief of Counterterrorism operations (Afghanistan and Pakistan) where he is currently assigned. In this capacity, he and his team safely evacuated 23 families who were under death threat from the Taliban from Afghanistan to Pakistan. He has since mitigated and thwarted a number of imminent terrorist threats posed by Al Qaeda and ISIS.

The most notable achievement during Peterson's tenure in the FBI was his investigation of a transnational hostage scheme which involved three U.S. businessmen who had been kidnapped by a Nigerian organized crime group in Nairobi, Kenya. Three kidnapers, including the ringleaders, were arrested following a controlled ransom delivery that he devised. Peterson's actions resulted in the recovery of the victims and ransom as well as prosecution of the Hostage-takers. To date, this hostage recovery is considered one of the most significant in FBI history.

Peterson now recalls how being a member of the Gamma Iota chapter had benefited him in many ways. He learned teamwork, brotherhood and leadership, as well as a few specific nuggets of knowledge he never would have believed would benefit him down the road. Case in point: Unbeknownst to him, having the Greek alphabet pounded into him during Gamma Iota's initiation process would later benefit him having to learn Greek during his assignment as the FBI's Chief of Operations in Athens. corps. 









MESSAGE FROM OUR ACB PRESIDENT

Brothers,

I would like to thank all of those who were able to attend the 70th plus 2 celebration of Gamma Iota. The event was a tremendous success and it was great to meet so many alumni. If you were not able to make the trip this time, start planning on attending the 75th in 2025. I would like to thank Eric Pickett and the rest of the 70th committee for all of their hard work during the past several years. I would also like to thank Aaron Williamson for bringing the energy while volunteering to Emcee the event. It was a special night for all who attended the Saturday dinner.

As we wrap up another school year we find ourselves at a crossroads with the chapter. The number of undergraduate members living in fell below the minimum set by ACB. The Fall 2021 grade report for the chapter was disappointing. While we anticipate improvements for the Spring Semester it will not be enough to offset the prior academic performance of the chapter. There are many causes to this but the ones that stick out the most was a lack of accountability, support for members who were struggling, and an academic plan in place that identifies grade risks earlier.

We have come a long way in the past 5 years. That being said, we have stagnated and stopped moving forward. In the 10 semesters since our suspension was lifted by the University, the house has been in the bottom third in grades 8 out of the last 10 semesters. Furthermore we have yet to have more than 22 members live in the chapter any given semester. From an Alumni standpoint we had tremendous success with fundraising and donated time to get the chapter open. Since the chapter was reopened our Alumni involvement, with the exception of the 70th, has all but disappeared. deserve new voices and fresh ideas. Since the chapter was reopened our From the alumni we will require a Alumni involvement, with the exception of the 70th, has all but disappeared. I understand part of this is related to COVID. The ACB is down to 3 active alumni and those left have surpassed any recommended tenured length for these positions. The undergraduate members and alumni deserve new voices and fresh ideas.

In March of this year I reached out to a group of "Stakeholders" within the alumni base. This group had donated the most time and money to get the chapter to where it is today. A letter detailing the current state of the chapter was sent out and was followed up by a conference call. During the call the overwhelming majority determined it was time to shut the facility down. The progress from the undergraduate members and involvement of alumni showed no sign of improving.

While we valued the input of the group it was decided by Ken Herzog and myself to keep the chapter open for one more year. This decision was made for two reasons. The first is we would have put the undergraduates in a difficult position where they may not have been able to find housing for the next year. Secondly, we did want to put a dark cloud over the 70th Celebration. Ken and I will continue to run ACB for now. There will be requirements on both the undergraduates and Alumni to keep the chapter open past May of 2023.

From the undergraduates they must exceed past performance in academics and recruiting. They must also continue to keep the receivables in line. Currently 10 semesters in a row with \$0 receivables. Finally, they must use the resources of the University and actively engage the mentorship of UAB group. For the Fall and Spring semester the chapter grades must be in the top third and exceed the all men's average for the university. Live-In house membership must

fully elected ACB no later than October of 2022. Brother Pickett will be stepping into a well-earned emeritus role with ACB following the 70th. That will leave Ken, Aaron, and myself as the remaining active members of the ACB. We can make this work short term, but it will not be a recipe for success. We will also challenge the UAB group to aggressively mentor the members in both academics and recruitment moving forward.

Simply put, the alumni need to re-engage with the chapter on a larger scale. Our hope is the enthusiasm from the 70th will result in some alumni stepping up to support efforts moving forward. If not, the October date gives us time to formulate a plan to properly close the facility. If this were to occur we will be exploring options with the University and Nationals, as to the disposition of the facility.

Beginning in June we will be holding ACB calls every 2-3 weeks. These calls are open to all Alumni. I will post the details on the Delta Sig Facebook page and will send out email notices inviting any inparties terested to participate.

But, while they may be having a break from academics, that does not mean they are slowing down when it comes to chapter operations!

The undergraduates and members of the Undergraduate Advisory Board will remain hard at work throughout the summer, reviewing data points gathered throughout the year, making progress on projects, and recruitment.

Over the course of the first year of this board being active, I have worked to gather data around a number of different areas in the aim to use this information for data-backed decisions making, to evaluate growing trends, and to provide better information to the alumni. This data has been centered around academic performance (both grades and study habits), recruitment numbers, and community wide historical data (transcribed from university records). As the data collection systems continue to be built I am looking to collect even more data from graduating members on their experience as members, their opinions on the effectiveness of programming, and potentially budget allocation. All of this information will serve to better our fraternity as we seek to understand what works and what doesn't, what improves actheir opinions on the effectiveness of programming, and potentially budget allocation. All of this information will serve to better our fraternity as we seek to understand what works and what doesn't, what improves academic performance and recruitment, and where to concentrate our efforts.

Without the need to focus on academics, time and energy is opened to focus on significant projects that may provide a strong foundation for the next year. This summer we are looking to produce guidelines and plans around social media usage to provide a continuous stream of information to the alumni from the undergraduates, a revamped web presence for the community and potential new members to better understand the organization, and updating chapter operations and officer guidelines. These efforts will assist in the new year and beyond by growing our presence with stakeholders and focusing on strengthening our foundation for excellence and brotherhood.

Our recruitment efforts must never be spent in vain. While it's true that since our rebuilding, led by myself and 3 other outstanding gentlemen, informal recruitment during the academic year has built stronger success stories; we have to continue to focus on the formal recruitment process and meeting with potential new members during the summer. Our board and the undergraduates will be meeting soon to provide updates to the recruitment plan before the first list of the summer is released. It is our hope that with an active recruitment advisor that is

s well acquainted with this form of recruitment, that we can begin to see stronger results from the undergraduates effort throughout the summer.




