



SAILOR SPOTLIGHT

It is difficult to sum up a man's life in a single page. Jeff "Dunby" Dunbar was born in New Mexico and moved to Idaho when he was 5 with his brother John and his folks Bob and Pam Dunbar. Attending Meridian High School, he was actively involved in football and track, where he left several records that remained on the books long after he graduated. In the fall of '88, he pledged Delta Sigma Phi. Talk to anyone who knew him, and he was just one of those men that had a lasting effect on people, and those that knew him, will never forget him.

Dunby was just the kind of person that you wanted to be around and was the epitome of a Delta Sig. His positive outlook on virtually everything was contagious. I always thought of him as "The Great Negotiator". Jeff had the uncanny ability to be objective in any situation, and everyone knew that what he was going to tell you was genuine, unbiased and on point. Throughout the house, Jeff was friends with everyone, but he and Mark Lynn hit it off early and would become lifelong friends. While serving as Rush Chairman with Ron Clark in 1989, they stayed with Mark at his folk's place in Spokane, where he met the love of his life,

Lesley Lynn. Lesley went to School at Eastern Washington University, which meant there were a fair number of road trips across state lines. The couple dated through college and Jeff proposed during Sailor's Ball in 1992 and they were married in August of 1993. The wedding was one of the most memorable ones I've attended, however I can guarantee that a greater part of the wedding party swore off red wine for life after the rehearsal dinner.

Dunby loved the outdoors. Hunting, fishing and rafting were his passions. During college, overnight trips to Moose Creek Reservoir, Spring Valley Reservoir, Moscow Mountain and Elk River were among some of the most anticipated trips of our college lives. We didn't have the best gear, but we always made do. Sitting around a fire in the middle of nowhere, sipping R&R, telling stories, and laughing till your sides hurt are some of my best memories in life.

After graduation, Jeff and Lesley settled into married life. They moved to Nampa, Idaho

where Jeff went to work for MPC computers and Lesley went to teaching school. Just coming out of college, no one had any money, but that didn't make any difference. There was always a reason to get together. The Dunbar Christmas Party, however, was legendary. Folks from work, brothers and friends from college and neighbors always looked forward to the annual get together. There was no shortage of food, fun, stories and maybe a couple of drinks. Ping pong tables set up in the garage, tables full of food, and lots of friends gathering to enjoy each other's company.

In February of 1998, the Dunbar's welcomed in a baby girl, Deidra. This little bundle was the highlight of their lives and Jeff couldn't have been more proud to be a dad and start writing a new chapter in life.

However, in November of 1999, the world took a bad turn. Jeff had been having some issues with numbness in his leg and after many appointments, he was diagnosed with a Glioblastoma brain tumor. The Dunbar's dug in and fought it with every ounce of passion and energy they could muster, but on April 5th of 2001, a blood clot sent him on his way to the Bond Eternal. 23 years have passed since Jeff left us, and I can honestly say that I think of him often and remember the good things he shared with me. He was a great influence in my life and being around him made us all want to be better men. Damn few individuals have such an impact on so many people, but in this life cut short, he left a lot of wonderful memories, unending respect, and a legacy to be proud of. I can't honestly think of a single person I've talked to that didn't feel the same way about Jeff.

There was no shortage of brothers from Jeff's era who wanted to contribute to this article when asked.

Mike Anderson PC '86; What I remember most about Jeff Dunbar? Every time I saw Jeff he would have a smile on his face. Jeff put a positive spin on everything, and I don't remember him ever saying a negative thing about anyone and we lived under one roof with 40 plus different personalities. He was one of those guys you wanted to be around. He was an exceptional person that everyone loved. The world missed out on so much when Jeff passed. I think about him often.

Kendall Kaiser PC '88; I was privileged to have Jeff Dunbar as a pledge brother. Jeff was a man of character. He remained calm when things got tough, and his level-headed advice saved me from many unwise decisions (although not all of them). I appreciated his sense of humor, his loyalty to his friends, and his leadership at Gamma Iota. Jeff was taken away from us way too early, but his legacy is one of true friendship and humility. All these years later, I still miss him. I look forward to sharing a beer with him again on the other side.

Ron Mowery PC '89; Jeff became my best friend when we were about 15. He was the reason I went to U of I and became a Delta Sig.

We used to give him a hard time about being a communications major. I have so many good memories of Jeff that it is hard to pick one. During our sophomore year we ended up taking one of our core classes together. He got a better grade in that class than I did and he only went to class the first day and on test days. I went to every single class and took notes, he would read my notes and that was it. His life was cut short, but he will always be in my heart.

Mike Bly PC '90; Jeff (Dunby) Dunbar was an upperclassman when I pledged Gamma Iota. While there were many who influenced and guided us as we figured out life as a freshman in the house, it is nearly impossible to properly describe the leadership and guidance Jeff provided us. He exemplified all of the qualities of a Delta Sig. He was an amazing friend and a foster big brother to many of us. In the same day he could set you straight if you needed it and still find time to make you laugh. The crazy part was he never really had to say much. You just knew. Movie night in the Penthouse is something I still miss.

'Diamond' Dave Morasch PC '90; Jeff Dunbar and Mark Lynn were instrumental in me becoming a Delta Sig. I spent quite a bit of time with them during rush and the 3 of us shared a common love of the outdoors, hunting and fishing.


During the last day of rush, more and more guys were pledging, and the bell rang over and over as another person was pledged. I got nervous that I wasn't going to get a bid so I started to head for another house to see if I could get a bid there. As I reached the edge of the property Jeff Dunbar and Mark Lynn grabbed me and said, "Not So Fast Bud!!!!!"

They pulled me back and sat me down with the rush chairmen and I was given a bid and I pledged. We all have so many moments in our lives, some big, some small, and then some moments though small at the time end up being pivotal in our journey in life. Jeff Dunbar and Mark Lynn grabbing me that day changed my life, changed my path, and introduced me to an organization and a brotherhood that I cherish to this very day at the ripe age of 52. I miss them both and am still thankful for what they saw in a farm kid from Eastern Washington.





ACB PRESIDENT LETTER

I am excited to share some significant updates regarding the restructuring of our Alumni Corporation Board (ACB) and the upcoming 75th Anniversary celebration of our chapter's founding.

Firstly, I want to emphasize our collaborative effort with Headquarters staff to streamline the ACB structure. Our aim is to eliminate unnecessary responsibilities and transition to a simpler, more efficient model for the board. Under this new structure, the ACB will focus solely on legal ownership of the house and oversee select financial decisions. The Collegiate Chapter Advisory Board (CCAB) will assume full responsibility for advising the undergraduates, while the Alumni Chapter (AC) will be revitalized with Headquarters support to manage events such as the Bike to Boise (B2B) Alumni Dinner and anniversary celebrations.

The primary goal behind these changes is to establish a sustainable model for our volunteers. Historically, we have grappled with volunteer burnout due to outdated systems and heavy responsibility loads. By implementing this new model, we hope to alleviate some of the challenges faced by ACBs nationwide.

We look to have this new model established before the end of the current ACB term, which is slated for turnover on August 1st. At which point, I will transition to an auxiliary support role to provide guidance with the new board and assist in a to-be-announced capacity.

Additionally, I am thrilled to announce that plans are underway for our chapter's 75th Anniversary celebration, scheduled to take place in Moscow next year. Our dedicated committee is hard at work organizing the event, and we have every confidence that it will be a resounding success, bringing together brothers from near and far to commemorate this milestone in our fraternity's history.

As we move forward with these initiatives, I invite your continued support and participation. Together, we can ensure the longevity and prosperity of our beloved fraternity.
